1. Number of clinics and setting (urban vs. rural vs. suburban)
2. Number of patients you care for

 - Can also help recruit new clinics to be a part of the network.
4. Number of faculty conducting family medicine research
5. What infrastructure do you have in place that can benefit primary research and/or primary care populations?
 - The combination of a research intense medical school with one or more community-based schools can be a powerful and successful model.¹
6. What support do you need to expand research in your department?
7. Who is involved (or could be involved) from your department via the department or a major grant program?
8. Are you involved with a Practice Based Research Network (PBRN)?
9. Does your institution already work with or have access to a local CTSI?
10. What does your family medicine department have that can meet the needs of the CTSI leadership (learning objectives, training missions, etc.)
11. What research topics (family medicine or PBRN) align with CTSI priorities?
12. Does your local CTSI have an initiative or need that compliments your work?
13. What community connections/agencies does your family medicine department have that can benefit the CTSI and provide additional opportunities (behavioral health programs, networks, etc.)
